A LETTER FROM OUR FOUNDER

"I am discovering that there are more abolitionists out there that I didn't even know existed. If we can be connected, we can do more... and we won't feel so alone." She didn't know it, but this young organizational leader articulated Dark Bali's core purpose. We exist so that local Indonesian anti-trafficking organizations, government agencies, and law enforcement can do more. Together.

The power of coalitions has become clear to those in this sector because we have learned that in order to combat powerful organized crime, we must be even more organized and even more connected. Only our collective voice of hope and justice will overwhelm that of greed and dehumanization.

In 2019, Dark Bali coalition experienced amazing growth as we connected with new partners all over the country who share the same vision and struggles. The need for resources, professional training, and updated research is high as is the desire for collaborative partnerships. OUR APPROACH

To meet the overwhelming needs that come with combatting human trafficking, Dark Bali works in the following ways:

Collaboration

establishes partnerships and coordinates between organizations

Contributions

adds important Indonesia-focused data collection and research to global knowledge

Community Resourcing

increases the resources available to the Indonesian anti-trafficking community



COLLABORATION

We recognize the power of collaboration. Therefore, we believe that human trafficking will only be eliminated when local abolitionists are effectively working together and have a voice in the global antitrafficking movement. Dark Bali's role is to strengthen this network and amplify the voices of Indonesian caregivers, policy makers, activists, and survivors. We do this through identifying and networking existing antitrafficking organizations into the Dark Bali coalition, facilitating regular Task Force meetings, coordinating projects between organizations and government entities, and connecting Indonesian organizations to international networks and resources.



Our three-year Task Force pilot project in Bali finished a multiple organizations, successful launch with law enforcement, and social services participating regularly. The Bali Task force has seen significant impact through efforts care, coordinate projects, streamline victim to and collaborate for more successful anti-trafficking prevention and responses. This successful model will be used to launch new Task Forces in other cities across Indonesia in 2020.

CONTRIBUTIONS

The 2019 US State Department's Trafficking in Persons Indonesia Report recognizes that "NGOs and past government reports estimated the number of child sex trafficking victims to be in the tens of thousands." This number is vague because there exists little current data available to those researching or developing

strategies targeted toward combating human trafficking within Indonesia. Dark Bali serves the grassroots Indonesian community by participating in data collection and research projects and serving as a bridge between our local partners and English-speaking stakeholders.

In addition to facilitating an introduction between Stop the Traffik UK and our local coalition partners, Dark Bali contributed data which the organization used for research purposes and eventually to generate a social media based prevention campaign focused on bringing human trafficking awareness to vulnerable youth in Bali. Over 500,000 people were reached and additional intelligence was gathered through this (ongoing) project.

COMMUNITY RESOURCING

Dark Bali supports local abolitionist leaders fighting against human trafficking in their own cities by listening and responding according to <u>their</u> goals and priorities. Strengthening the reach and capacity of this community is at the core of Dark Bali's mission. We do this by providing needed training, translating quality resources into Indonesian, identifying/addressing current gaps in the national antitrafficking response, and facilitating access into global antitrafficking networks.





At the request of local coalition partners and leaders on the island of Nusa Tenggara Timur (NTT), Dark Bali sponsored a training of trainers event on human trafficking prevention. NTT's poor economy leads many vulnerable people to seek employment in places like Bali or Malaysia only to find themselves trafficked into the sex, fishing, or logging industries. The 20 community leaders who completed the training identified many of the risk factors for their communities, and within the week, the material was already being presented in local public high schools.

OTHER PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

In early 2018, Dark Bali received information about an East African victim in Bali. The information was quickly passed to our coalition partners who were able to verify the accuracy of the tip. They then worked together to identify the victim and advocate for her within the immigrations office while officials sorted out their next steps. Within a month, the victim was able to return home to her family in Africa.

Through Liberty Shared's Media Monitoring project, Dark Bali contributed the information to create and update **5 trafficker criminal profiles**. This project aims to freeze the financial assets of human traffickers in the global banking industry.

MEET OUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Ruth Hubbard, Board Chair

Ruth joined Wycliffe Bible Translators as a designer in 2002. In 2005, she became the Vice President for Communications, before spending 6 years as a Senior Vice President. Dalaina moved to Bali, Indonesia in 2014 where she volunteered for a local non-profit which operates a shelter for female teen survivors of sex trafficking. Her role was to train and develop the staff in better standards of care. At the urging of local colleagues, she expanded this role to include members of multiple organizations, and Dark Bali was born. She holds a BA in Intercultural Studies from Biola University and a Master's Degree in Global Leadership with an emphasis in Children at Risk from Fuller Seminary.

Juliana Williams, Board Secretary

Juliana serves as the Executive Director of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Bend. Previously she led programs and operations for In Our Backyard (IOB), an anti-human trafficking nonprofit based in Central Oregon which focuses on prevention, education and advocacy in the USA. Earlier in her career, Williams developed the first-ever, comprehensive community relations program for global eyewear and sports leader, Oakley, Inc, and led a project team to launch the Infinite Hero Foundation. She lives with her husband and two growing boys in the outdoor paradise of Bend, OR.



Dennis Griggs, Board Member

Dennis spent his early career (1965-1989) in Germany where he founded and led Campus Crusade for Christ, Germany and later the Institute for Church Growth, Germany. When he returned to the USA, he worked as a pastor until retiring in 2017. Currently Dennis is the team leader for R.E.A.C.H (Richfield - Education, Action, and Compassion for (anti-) Human Trafficking), which is a church based anti-human trafficking volunteer ministry. He is also a team member for the Orange County Human Trafficking Task Force, and a contributor to Orangewood Foundation's Community Trafficking Forum.





Matthew Maloney, Dark Bali Indonesia Board Chair

Matt moved to Bali in 2014 after teaching secondary level Science for 9 years in schools in both the US and Peru. After moving to Bali, Matt began to volunteer with several organizations, including Dark Bali, and currently serves as a cross-cultural liaison to a locally run non-profit.

Andy Prawira, Dark Bali Indonesia Vice Chair

Andy is the founder and director of Generasi Bisa, an Indonesian non-profit focused on addressing social issues impacting young Indonesians including drugs, HIV/AIDS, domestic violence, discrimination, prostitution, human trafficking, and poverty. In 2013, Andy was honored with an award from UNESCO for his work in peace-making and religious reconciliation among Indonesian youth.





Yohana Pandhi, Dark Bali Indonesia Board Trustee

Yohana brings years of experience working on behalf of Indonesian's women and children. After retiring from a long career as the head of the anti-trafficking unit of Bali's police force, Yohana took on the role of Director of Women and Children's Services for a local non-profit which includes overseeing the island's only safehouse for teenage girls. She recently passed the bar exam in order to better support and advocate for those in her care.

Jessy Magdalena, Dark Bali Indonesia Treasurer

Jessy has been deeply involved in Bali's anti-trafficking movement for years. During her time leading World Relief Indonesia's Unit for Trafficking and Psychosocial support, she was instrumental in the birth and early development of Dark Bali. She currently works as the director for PT Uno Amico Indonesia.
